1. Course Objectives:

This course on Theories of Justice comes under the Political Thought. The course of Political Thought, a major branch of Political Science is meant to train and equip the students the comprehensive knowledge and ideas of various political thinkers, ranging from the classical to the contemporary times. Political thought essentially deals with the views, ideas and speculations of different political thinkers on numerous political aspects from time to time. As a matter of fact, political thought is a study of how political thinkers attempt to explain the causes and consequences of various political issues and problems. It also analyses as to how political thinkers have provided different frameworks and propositions to address the problems occurring in society, thereby showing the ways for better alternatives.

In this course on Theories of Justice, the objective is to introduce students to various theories of justice. This course aims to dissect various thinkers from diverse schools of thought who propound theories of justice. As there is progress in human society each passing day, new challenges and needs keep recurring. The question of justice keeps coming throughout the human history. It is extremely pertinent for students to understand the theories of justice—past and present. This course is also designed with a view to widening the horizons of students on the complexities inherent in the theories of justice. With several theories on justice having been advanced by several thinkers, the scope of discussion on justice has also vastly widened. This course also aims to re-examine many of the leading theories on justice afresh.

2. TEACHING METHODOLOGY:

National Law University, Assam has framed its own teaching methodology to train its students in learning and understanding of political aspects and issues. The teaching methodology is not just confined to a traditional lecture method but a participatory teaching method with an aim to discuss on various current political aspects. The pedagogy followed is the combination of lectures and intense discussions in the class. This course requires students to engage in seminars or group discussions for which topics and themes will be assigned well in advance. Assignments will be also assigned to the students as a part of the course. The students are also encouraged to do independent research on their respective assignments. Every student is required to present their topics and clear their doubts through discussion.
